- Binge drinking was responsible for >70% of the total excessive drinking costs in all states - \$191.1 billion in 2010. (2010 National and State Costs of Excessive Alcohol Consumption. Am J Prev Med, 2015)
- There were 30,000 American deaths from alcohol-induced causes in 2014. These deaths included alcohol poisoning and cirrhosis, liver damage primarily caused by drinking; but didn't even include deaths from drunk driving and homicides committed under the influence of alcohol. (CDC, 2015)
- In 2014 more people died from alcohol-induced causes (30,722) than from overdoses of prescription painkillers and heroin combined (28,647).

- Kentucky's past month binge alcohol use among youth aged 12-20 remains below the 2013-2014 U.S. average (KY-7.2% vs. U.S.-9.1%).
- Kentucky's annual average of heavy alcohol use among adults aged 21 or older was similar to the national annual average from 2010 to 2014 (KY-6.6% vs. U.S.-6.7%).

Recent updates (informational purposes only):

■ SB11 "Omnibus Alcohol Bill" passed the Senate with a 29-8 vote, and was referred to the House Licensing & Occupations Committee. This bill includes a powdered alcohol ban, an authorized public consumption license for commercial quadricycles, and increased amounts of packaged alcohol sold at distilleries and permitted for sampling.



- <u>SB12 relating to an extended hours supplemental license</u> passed the Senate with a 28-8-1 vote, and was referred to the House Licensing & Occupations Committee.
- <u>SB56 "Brianna Taylor Act"</u> named for Brianna, a 17-year old graduate of Elizabethtown High School killed in a summer 2014 car crash, to expand the look-back window for prior DUI offenses from five to 10 years passed the Senate with a 31-1 vote, and was referred to the House Health & Welfare Committee.
- Two new bills related to alcohol were introduced on 01/19/16 SB110 to allow cities to impose a regulatory license fee on the sale of alcoholic beverages; and HB253 relating to microbreweries.
